Description:

This variety produces arrowhead shaped leaves that emerge bright yellow, and mature to chartreuse, then lime green; unique closed orchid flowers on yellow stems in mid-summer; perfect for shade and woodland gardens

Ornamental Features

Tiny Bubbles Hosta features dainty spikes of white orchid-like flowers rising above the foliage in mid summer. Its attractive pointy leaves emerge yellow in spring, turning chartreuse in colour throughout the season. The yellow stems are very colorful and add to the overall interest of the plant.

Landscape Attributes

Tiny Bubbles Hosta is a dense herbaceous perennial with tall flower stalks held atop a low mound of foliage. Its relatively fine texture sets it apart from other garden plants with less refined foliage.

This is a relatively low maintenance plant, and is best cleaned up in early spring before it resumes active growth for the season. Gardeners should be aware of the following characteristic(s) that may warrant special consideration;

- Insects

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Planting & Growing

Tiny Bubbles Hosta will grow to be about 8 inches tall at maturity extending to 16 inches tall with the flowers, with a spread of 16 inches. When grown in masses or used as a bedding plant, individual plants should be spaced approximately 12 inches apart. Its foliage tends to remain low and dense right to the ground. It grows at a slow rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 10 years. As an herbaceous perennial, this plant will usually die back to the crown each winter, and will regrow from the base each spring. Be careful not to disturb the crown in late winter when it may not be readily seen!

This plant does best in partial shade to shade. It prefers to grow in average to moist conditions, and shouldn't be allowed to dry out. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is somewhat tolerant of urban pollution. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid. It can be propagated by division; however, as a cultivated variety, be aware that it may be subject to certain restrictions or prohibitions on propagation.
