



**Eyes On The Prize Daylily**  
*Hemerocallis 'Eyes On The Prize'*

**Description:**

Large, coral-peach trumpets with contrasting deep burgundy eyezone and matching burgundy ruffled edges; great grassy texture and form; tetraploid; a highly noticeable color addition to the garden or border

**Ornamental Features**

Eyes On The Prize Daylily features bold lightly-scented peach trumpet-shaped flowers with coral-pink overtones, yellow throats and burgundy centers at the ends of the stems from early to mid summer. The flowers are excellent for cutting. Its grassy leaves remain light green in colour throughout the season.

**Landscape Attributes**

Eyes On The Prize Daylily is an herbaceous perennial with a shapely form and gracefully arching foliage. Its medium texture blends into the garden, but can always be balanced by a couple of finer or coarser plants for an effective composition.

This is a relatively low maintenance plant, and is best cleaned up in early spring before it resumes active growth for the season. It is a good choice for attracting butterflies to your yard. It has no significant negative characteristics.

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### **Planting & Growing**

Eyes On The Prize Daylily will grow to be about 15 inches tall at maturity, with a spread of 18 inches. When grown in masses or used as a bedding plant, individual plants should be spaced approximately 14 inches apart. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 10 years. As an herbaceous perennial, this plant will usually die back to the crown each winter, and will regrow from the base each spring. Be careful not to disturb the crown in late winter when it may not be readily seen!

This plant does best in full sun to partial shade. It is very adaptable to both dry and moist locations, and should do just fine under typical garden conditions. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid. It can be propagated by division; however, as a cultivated variety, be aware that it may be subject to certain restrictions or prohibitions on propagation.
